Topic	Summary	
Welcome and opening Sririsay Vukovic, Chair, Western Sydney Parklands CTB	 The meeting was opened by the Chair and an Acknowledgment of Country was given. No new conflicts of interest were declared. Further information about items in the previous meeting summary was requested. Responses will be provided by GSP. 	
Environmental programs update Zach Muldoon, Assistant Project Officer, Environment and Sustainability, GSP	 GSP outlined progress against the draft Biodiversity Strategy, noting it will be released for public comment in early 2025. Information was also provided about the hollow creation works, bushland regeneration works, pest control program, and the partnerships GSP has formed to support the parklands. The CTB shared the following queries and comments: 	
	management of rabbits and foxes.	
	 whether GSP is concerned that 1080 poison is used in the parkland when it is widely banned overseas, and whether there is secondary poisoning to small mammals in the parkland. 	
	 ensuring hollow creation is not compensating for tree loss. 	
	 concern about the lack of wildlife corridors connecting the different parklands and a question about available information on GSP's approach to wildlife / bushland corridors in Western Sydney Parklands. 	
	 suggestion to discuss the opportunity for native food education and guided tours in the parkland with Muru Mittigar. 	
	Action: GSP to provide information about approach to wildlife / bushland corridors.	
Plan of Management – Tourism and land use Ben Tax, Director Property Services, GSP	GSP provided information about the Western Sydney Parklands Plan of Management 2018 from a tourism land use perspective. GSP also outlined the future tourism opportunities for Western Sydney Parklands and noted the NSW Government's tourism goal to have visitors spend \$91 billion annually by 2035, a 40% increase on the previous goal.	
	CTB members were interested in understanding the community engagement process and the collaboration/partnership approach to planning the new tourism opportunities.	

Topic	Summary
	The CTB shared the following queries and comments:
	 important to identify local community needs alongside the needs and interests of international visitors who are likely to want to see wildlife or participate in day trips etc.
	 important to identify preferred visitation numbers (capacity) at the parkland, without impacting the environment.
	 suggestion for field trips and education centres for young children about the native wildlife.
	 noted that Mount Annan Botanic Gardens has great bushcraft offerings and the café in Cumberland State Forest, <u>Café Salinga</u>, is a good example of an immersive experience e.g. bush tucker tours.
	 suggestion for an established agritourism experience or farmgate tour to showcase and educate about local growing.
	 explore options for local ownership of new tourism opportunities, encourage co-design. Consider careful development in the landscape. Concern raised regarding large hotel chains.
	 explore diverse accommodation options for both visitors and workers such as hostels or cabins. Promote staycations.
	 promote 'Western Sydney' positively and find the point of difference/unique offering of the area and leverage this. Unique offerings noted were the natural environment, arts and culture and food. Underpin the local economic development through entertainment and performance space opportunities.
